- Parents or districts may recommend/request consideration for an out of district placement.
- In order for the district to pay for a placement the IEP team must decide it's the most appropriate program due to:
 - The district not having a program to meet the student's specialized education needs.
 - The student isn't making adequate progress in the indistrict program.
 - The student's medical or behavioral needs can only be met in a specialized program.



- The IEP team should consider when deciding if a student should be placed out-of-district:
 - The least restrictive environment the student can learn in?
 - What's the best environment for the student? Is it a mainstream school, a special school or a residential school?
 - Can the school give the student <u>special education</u> <u>services</u> required by the IEP?
 - What's the closest placement that meets the needs for the student?



- IDEA requires students who receive <u>special</u> <u>education</u> to learn in the least restrictive environment. This means they should spend as much time as possible with peers who do not receive special education.
 - A student should be in general education to the "maximum extent that is appropriate."
 - Special classes, separate schools or removal from the general education class should only happen the disability is so severe that supplementary aids and services can't provide an appropriate education.



 The key is "appropriate." It refers to what's suitable or right for the student. Sometimes, putting a child in a general education classroom isn't suitable because a specific service or program can't be provided there.



- Least Restrictive Placement Continuum:
 - General Classroom with Modifications 80-100% of the time
 - Resource Room, 40-79% with non-disabled peers
 - Self-Contained Classroom, 0-39% with non-disabled peers
 - Separate Day School
 - Residential Facility
 - Home/Hospital



- SD Least Restrictive Placement Continuum:
 - Reported on Dec. 1, 2018 for ages 6-21
