## 2021 South Dakota Legislature

FISCAL NOTE 2021-FN1034A (HOUSE AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES ENGROSSED)

HB1034 - An Act to revise certain youth hunting requirements.

HB1034, as amended, would replace the need to issue the resident junior combination license by allowing residents under 18, as opposed to 16, to fish and take fur-bearing animals without a permit. Residents and nonresidents under 18 would not be required to purchase a fishing license. The bill would repeal the nonresident family fishing license. The bill would not change §41-6-13 requiring any persons under 16 that were issued a hunting license must be accompanied by a parent, guardian, or mentor.

The fiscal estimate to the State would be a decrease of approximately (\$290,306) in other fund revenue under the control of the Department of Game, Fish and Parks (GF&P).

Table 1 shows the fees and 2019 annual sales for every license type germane to the bill. The net change in license sales is based on changes in the bill. A reduction in sales is due to changing the age limit from 16 to 18.

According to GF&P, the long-term expected benefit could likely be a higher retention rate of licensees due to the change in age. The bill would likely increase sales tax revenue to the State and municipalities by a marginal amount due to an economic incentive for nonresidents to hunt and fish in South Dakota.
