1	An Act to authorize the use of crossbows by senior hunters.
2	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA:
3	Section 1. That § 41-6-10 be AMENDED:
4	41-6-10. Licenses, permits, and stamps issued under this title are classified as
5	follows:
6	(1) Disabled hunter permit;
7	(2) Export bait dealer license;

(33) Taxidermist's license; 15 16 (33A)(34) Spring snow goose temporary nonresident license; 17 (33B)(35) Early fall Canada goose temporary nonresident license; and 18 (34)(36) Temporary fishing and hunting licenses. 19 The rights and privileges of such licensees are set forth in §§ 41-6-12 to 41-6-20 45.1, inclusive, and in § 41-17-13. 21 The Game, Fish and Parks Commission shall promulgate rules, pursuant to chapter 22 1-26, to set the fees, eligibility, and duration for such licenses. 23 Section 2. That § 41-8-31 be AMENDED: 24 41-8-31. No person may at any time hunt, catch, take, attempt to take, or kill any 25 small game or game animal in any other manner than by shooting the same with a firearm, 26 except: 27 (1)Game birds and animals may be taken with birds: 28 Birds trained in falconry-or with bow and arrow; (a) 29 (b) Bow and arrow; or 30 (c) A crossbow, equipped with a draw-lock device, if: 31 The person is at least sixty-five years of age; and (i) 32 (ii) In possession of a senior-hunter crossbow permit, issued by the 33 department;

- (1A)(2) Cottontail rabbit, red squirrel, fox squirrel, grey squirrel, and any species defined
 as a predator/varmint in § 41-1-1 may be taken with an air gun that complies with
 specifications established by rules promulgated by the Game, Fish and Parks
 Commission pursuant to chapter 1-26;
- 5 (2)(3) A person with a permanent or temporary disability who is missing an upper limb,
 6 physically incapable of using an upper limb, or confined to a wheelchair, may obtain
 7 a disabled hunter permit to use a crossbow or other legal bow, equipped with a
 8 draw-lock device, to take game birds and animals;
- 9 (3)(4) A person who is legally blind, is legally licensed, possesses a disabled hunter
 10 permit, and is physically present and participates in the hunt but cannot safely
 11 discharge a firearm or bow and arrow, may claim game birds and animals taken
 12 by a designated hunter in accordance with the license possessed by the hunter who
 13 is legally blind;
- (3A)(5) A person who is quadriplegic, is legally licensed, possesses a disabled hunter
 permit, and is physically present and participates in the hunt but cannot safely
 discharge a firearm or bow and arrow, may claim game birds and animals taken
 by a designated hunter in accordance with the license possessed by the hunter who
 is quadriplegic; and
- (4)(6) A person with a permanent or temporary disability as defined in subdivision (2)
 ofdescribed in this section, who is legally licensed for a youth big game hunting
 season, possesses a disabled hunter permit, and is physically present and
 participates in the hunt but is unable to safely discharge a firearm or bow and
 arrow, may claim any big game animal taken by a designated hunter in accordance
 with the youth big game license possessed by the person with a permanent or
 temporary disability.
- 26 A violation of this section is a Class 2 misdemeanor.

27 Section 3. That § 41-8-31.1 be AMENDED:

- **41-8-31.1.** The provisions of Notwithstanding § 41-8-31 notwithstanding, any:
- <u>Any</u> person who holds a big game license to take a big game animal during the
 firearm season may take the animal by using a crossbow in lieu of a firearm; and
- 31 (2) Any person who holds a license to take a big game animal during archery season
- 32 <u>may take the animal by using a crossbow, in lieu of any other legal bow, if:</u>
- 33 (a) The person is at least sixty-five years of age; and

1	(b) In possession of a senior-hunter crossbow permit, issued by the
2	department.
3	As used in this section, the term, crossbow, means a device for propelling a bolt
4	by means of traverse limbs mounted on a stock and a string. The crossbow may be drawn,
5	held, and released by a mechanical device and shall <u>must</u> have at least one hundred
6	twenty-five pounds pull and have a working mechanical safety.
