On the Introduced bill, delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

37 "

Section 1. That a NEW SECTION be added to title 49:

39 Terms used in this chapter mean:

- 1 (1) "Biogas gathering line," new and existing gathering pipeline facilities in South Dakota that transport gas from a bio-methane producer to an interstate or intrastate gas pipeline;

 3 (2) "Commission," the Public Utilities Commission;
- 4 (3) "Gas," natural gas, liquefied natural gas, flammable gas, gas which is toxic or corrosive, or liquefied petroleum gas in distribution systems.

Section 2. That a NEW SECTION be added to title 49:

- Any person who operates an intrastate biogas gathering line shall prior to operation provide written notice of the location and existence of the biogas gathering line to:
- 9 (1) Any county and township where the biogas gathering line is located;
- 10 (2) Any municipality located in those counties and townships;
- 11 (3) South Dakota One-Call;
- 12 <u>(4) The Commission;</u>

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- 13 (5) All landowners of record who own land within one-quarter mile of the biogas 14 gathering line.
- All notices must warn of the hazards and dangers associated with the biogas gathering line and its contents.

Section 3. That a NEW SECTION be added to title 49:

Any person who operates a biogas gathering line on an easement or in public right of way must place and maintain signage marking the biogas gathering line for the life of the biogas gathering line. Signage must be in the rights-of-way and placed at all public road crossings and railroad crossings and in sufficient numbers so that the biogas gathering line location is accurately and easily known. Signage must prominently display the operator's name, a twenty-four-hour emergency telephone number for the operator, the word, warning, or danger, and the phrase, biogas pipeline. Prior to commencement of operation, the operator shall certify to the Commission that the operator has completed the requirements of this chapter.

Section 4. That a NEW SECTION be added to title 49:

If the Commission finds, after notice and opportunity for hearing, that a person has failed to comply with any requirement of this chapter, the Commission may suspend or restrict the operation of the pipeline and may order the person to comply with this chapter. The Commission may issue a temporary ex parte order to suspend or restrict operation if the Commission determines a likelihood of immediate serious harm to life, health, environment, or property exists. The operator has the right of appeal from such decisions as provided by chapter 1-26. The Commission may apply to the circuit court in any county in which the biogas gathering line operates for orders that enjoin operation.

Section 5. That a NEW SECTION be added to title 49:

- Any person who operates a biogas gathering line other than in compliance with this chapter is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor and is subject to a civil penalty of not more than ten thousand dollars."

Apa; the Honorable Kathryn "Kay" Davis-Sturzenbecher; the Honorable James "Jim" Emery; the Honorable Robert "Bob" Faehn; the Honorable Wendell H. Hanson; the Honorable David E. Lust; the Honorable Elaine McCart; the Honorable Roger R. Moore; the Honorable James Sperry; the Honorable Dale Slaughter; the Honorable Carveth "Carv" Thompson; the Honorable Robert R. "Bob" Weber; and the Honorable Charles B. Welke.

WHEREAS, in the lives of all of these eminent public servants there was noted a profound urgency in an unselfish manner, with trials and vicissitudes often far outweighing honors, but with a consciousness that here in a land of freedom the dignity of the individual is supreme, that justice must be dispensed, and that only by eternal vigilance and unrelenting effort can self-government of a people be preserved; and

WHEREAS, it is fitting that we humbly honor the memory of those who have thus contributed to the orderly process of government under the Constitution:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Ninety-seventh Session of the Legislature of the State of South Dakota duly convened in recess session in recognition of the useful lives and unfailing devotion to the interests of the State of South Dakota, as well as the rectitude of thought and action and fidelity to the highest principles of American citizenship by these honorable people, that the Senate and the House of Representatives do now pause in their labors out of respect for the memory of their late fellow associates in the functions of government, and note that in their passing, the state they have served so well has suffered a distinct loss, and though their labors have ceased and they have been laid to rest, the people of this great state have benefited greatly from the services rendered by them and they have left upon the sands of time an inspiring record of devotion to their fellow citizens under the guiding hand of Almighty God; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution be printed in the journals of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Ninety-seventh Session of the Legislature of the State of South Dakota, now assembled this 20th day of January, 2022, at Pierre, South Dakota.
