# CONTINUAL PURSUIT OF EFFICIENCIES


- School of Education reorganized its administrative structure within the Dean's Office and the Center for Student and Professional Services with an associated cost savings of \$184,000. The school also reduced reliance on adjunct faculty, instead focusing on full-time faculty members, which resulted in savings of \$80,000 per academic year.
- ▶ USD reduced institutional research staff by .5 FTE by absorbing external survey submission duties into Information Technology Services (ITS). By automating data collection, **USD** is able to execute surveys with less time and effort; in many cases, surveys are completed in less than half the time.
- ▶ ITS and the Provost Office streamlined and digitized the tenure and promotion process, saving time and printing costs. This also resulted in strengthened security, enhanced productivity, increased employee satisfaction and efficiencies for faculty and reviewers.






#### USD LEADS IN AFFORDABILITY

The South Dakota Freedom Scholarship is South Dakota's first public/private partnership for a needs-based scholarship, made possible by the generosity of First PREMIER Bank/PREMIER Bankcard, the State of South Dakota under the leadership of Gov. Noem, Avera Health and Sanford Health.

#### GRADUATION RATES - SIX YEAR





#### **RETENTION RATES**





UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH DAKOTA

- Technology Readiness Acceleration Center (TRAC), established in 2020, supports entrepreneurship and startup creation by pairing students with new technologies to develop.

#### **BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS**

# USD appreciates the ongoing support recommended from Governor Noem in the following areas that will positively impact USD's community:

- Salary Policy 5.0% increase in general funds, as well as other and federal authority, to fund employee salary policy.
- \$461,466 Increase in general funds to reimburse for offering free tuition for South Dakota National Guard members.
- Maintenance & Repair Increase in general funds for maintenance and repair at 1.75% of replacement value.
- **\$5.1 million** one-time to the BOR in support of system-wide cybersecurity upgrades to help address potential cyber threats.



#### **AFFORDABILITY**

Affordability remains a high concern for a majority of USD's students. The table below depicts the out-of-pocket balance remaining for the average South Dakota student, depending on their Expected Family Contribution (EFC). Even for in-state resident students receiving significant financial aid support, there remains a sizable gap that is not covered by scholarships, loans or grants. Recent enrollment trends show growth stemming from students who do not receive federal aid (i.e., Pell grants) other than loans because of a high EFC.

#### DECLINING ENROLLMENT

Demographers have noted that after 2025, the number of high school graduates nationally will begin to decline as a result of slower birth rates following the Great Recession (2007-2009). The U.S. will have fewer high school graduates in every graduating class between 2026 and 2037.

- National Projections: Over the next 15 years, between 2022 and 2037, projections indicate that the number of high school graduates in the United States will decrease by 6.7%.
- ▶ **Regional Projections:** Between 2022 and 2037, projections indicate that the number of high school graduates in South Dakota and its contiguous states (North Dakota, Wyoming, Montana, Iowa, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska) will decrease by 1.7%.
- ▶ **South Dakota Projections:** Between 2022 and 2037, projections indicate that the number of high school graduates in South Dakota will increase 2.2%.

#### **College Attendance**

South Dakota is experiencing a decline in the percentage of students attending postsecondary institutions. For the 2016-2017 school year, 68% of high school graduates attended a postsecondary institution (either a two-year or four-year institution). That percentage was consistent with high school graduating classes over the previous decade. However, the percentage of students attending postsecondary institutions after high school graduation has declined in the last five years. For the 2021-2022 school year, the percentage dropped to 62%.



#### **WORKFORCE RECRUITING & RETENTION**

USD continues to strategize on ways to address market compensation challenges and investing in programs to increase employee recruitment and retention

- ▶ 1,500+ total employees, annual turnover rate of 15.5%
- ▶ Recruit approximately 200 faculty and staff each year
- ▶ 96 employees are eligible to retire this year, with a total of 155 being eligible within the next 5 years
- Recruitment remains a challenge market compensation, USD's rural location



### USD - SIOUX FALLS

With a clearly defined mission, marketed under the established USD brand, USD – Sioux Falls has been able to leverage existing buildings and assets to:

- Serve the region's premier health care systems
- Provide pathways to a four-year degree
  - underserved students who cannot or do not wish to leave Sioux Falls
- nontraditional, career-oriented individuals who would benefit from a four-year or advanced degree
- high school students who currently do not go on to pursue post-secondary education




#### SIMULATION & INTERPROFESSIONAL EDUCATION

Simulation and interprofessional education are key to USD's curriculum and the future of health care education. Using cutting-edge technology and equipment to create innovative and realistic patient care scenarios, these real-life immersion experiences promote the development of leadership and strong communication skills.

- Aspiring nurses and nurse anesthetists learn alongside physicians, social workers, physical and occupational therapists, physician assistants and others to effectively communicate, problem-solve, coordinate patient care and deliver team-based care.
- Relocation of a number of Sioux Falls-based health sciences programs to the USD Sioux Falls campus allowed for the expansion of the Parry Center for Clinical Skills and Simulation. Expansion includes the addition of a simulated surgical suite and an intensive care unit, increasing capacity for additional interprofessional education and simulation.



- Independent rural hospitals and health clinics
- ▶ 36 grants awarded from extramural agencies totaling over \$11 million in 2022
- Research Coordinator hired to work with partner institutions, leading to increasing research experiences for all medical students

#### Frontier And Rural Medicine (FARM)

- 8 sites, 13 students in Class of 2026 Cohort
- Students engage in these communities
- Highly evaluated by students
- 57% of FARM graduates have matched in family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics
- 83% of FARM graduates have matched in a primary discipline if including obstetrics and psychiatry
- Nationally recognized program: other schools with rural focus interested in learning from us







#### GRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

- Clinical training experiences required post-MD for licensing
- ► Eight residency and four fellowship programs (neurology to be added 2024)
- Annual economic impact of \$16.5 million
- SSOM grads who complete residency in SD:75% stay to practice in SD
- Non-SSOM grads who complete residency in SD: 46% stay to practice in SD
- Recently expanded number of family medicine slots in Rapid City
- Rural family medicine residency in Pierre

- Experience in free health care clinics in Sioux Falls,
   Yankton, Vermillion (rank 99th percentile nationally)
- Educate elementary, high school, college students in SD about careers in health professions or biological sciences (rank 99th percentile nationally)

- Curricular emphasis on health care for underserved and rural health / interprofessional collaboration
- Increased presence in Rosebud and Pine Ridge
- FARM students participate in community projects with far reaching impact

# SSOM'S IMPACT ON WORKFORCE: A SPOTLIGHT ON YANKTON, S.D.

- 47 of 62 practicing MDs (76%) in Yankton are SSOM graduates
- 27 of 62 practicing MDs (44%) trained on the Yankton campus
- 31 of 37 (84%) MDs at the Yankton Medical Clinic are SSOM graduates
- 22 of 37 (60%) MDs at the Yankton Medical Clinic trained on the Yankton campus
