That chapter 13-55 be amended with a NEW SECTION: 4 A behavioral health scholarship awarded pursuant to sections 5 to 13, inclusive, of this Act is 5 automatically renewed upon verification by the Board of Regents that the student is pursuing an 6 eligible major or program and maintains eligibility pursuant to section 6 of this Act. 7 If a student is no longer pursing an eligible major or program or does not maintain eligibility, 8 the Board of Regents shall notify the student that the total amount of scholarship funds awarded to 9 the student are converted to an interest-bearing loan . 10 The Board of Regents may grant an exception, upon application of the student and for good 11 cause shown, to the continuous enrollment requirement in section 6 of this Act. 12 Section 11. That chapter 13-55 be amended with a NEW SECTION: 13 As a condition of accepting a behavioral health scholarship, a student shall agree, in writing: 14 (1) To serve in a field related to behavioral health, as referenced in section 5 of this Act, in 15 this state for a period of five years following graduation or completion of the academic program 16 being pursued; and 17 (2) That failure to pursue an eligible major or program, or to maintain the eligibility 18 requirements in section 6 of this Act, shall result in the scholarship being converted to an interest-19 bearing loan. 20 If the student is unable to meet the employment requirements of this section within six years 21 following graduation or completion of the academic program being pursued, the Board of Regents 22 shall initiate collection proceedings for the purpose of recouping a pro rata share of the total amount 23 of behavioral health scholarships awarded to the student, based on the percentage of the five-year 24 period during which the student was not engaged in the field of behavioral health. 25 The Board of Regents may, upon application of the student and for good cause shown, delay 26 or elect to waive the loan or collection proceedings. 27 Section 12. That chapter 13-55 be amended with a NEW SECTION: 28 The Board of Regents shall verify a behavioral health scholarship recipient's employment status 29 within six months of graduation or completion of the academic program being pursued, and annually 30 thereafter. If the Board of Regents is unable to verify the recipient's employment status in a 31 behavioral health field or the individual no longer works in this state, the Board of Regents shall 32 notify the recipient that collection proceedings will be initiated. 33 Section 13. There is created in the education enhancement trust fund the behavioral health scholarship fund, for the purpose of administering and funding scholarships provided by sections 5 to 13, inclusive, of this Act. Distributions from the behavioral health scholarship fund are subject to transfer to the general fund, and expenditure of distributions must be by an appropriation by the Legislature through the General Appropriations Act or a special appropriation for behavioral health scholarships consistent with the provision of S.D. Const., Art. XII, § 6, and § 4-5-29.2.

- The following monies must be deposited into the fund:
- 9 <u>(1) Any monies transferred by the Legislature for the purposes provided in sections 5 to 13, inclusive, of this Act;</u>
 - (2) Any gifts, grants, or donations received for scholarships provided by this Act; and
- 12 (3) Any monies and interest repaid from an individual who failed to meet the eligibility 13 or employment requirements.

Section 15. That § 4-5-29.2 be AMENDED:

4-5-29.2. Pursuant to S.D. Const., Art. XII, § 6, the state investment officer shall determine the market value of the education enhancement trust fund as of December 31, 2003, and each calendar year thereafter less the investment expenses transferred pursuant to § 4-5-30. The state investment officer shall calculate an amount equal to four percent of that market value, without invading principal, as eligible for distribution. For the purpose of this section, the term, principal, means the sum of all contributions to the fund. Beginning with the distribution in fiscal year 2008, the market value-shall be is determined by adding the market value of the trust fund at the end of the sixteen most recent calendar quarters as of December thirty-first, and dividing the sum by sixteen. Upon notice of that amount by the state investment officer, the state treasurer shall transfer the amount from the education enhancement trust fund to the state general fund as soon as practicable after July first of the next fiscal year. For fiscal year 2017, the portion of the transfer to the general fund for the postsecondary scholarship grant programs shall be \$126,707.35. Beginning in fiscal year 2018, the The portion of the transfer to the general fund for the postsecondary scholarship grant programs and the behavioral health scholarship, shall must be calculated by the state investment officer based on the relative share of the contributions made to the postsecondary scholarship grant fund created pursuant to § 13-55A-14 and the behavioral health scholarship fund created pursuant to section 14 of this Act to the most recently calculated total fair value of the education enhancement fund including the contribution. The calculation-shall must be updated monthly to reflect any additional contributions to the education enhancement trust fund and the. The portion of the transfer to the general fund for the postsecondary scholarship grant programs shall be and the behavioral health scholarship fund is based on the average of the monthly calculation as of December thirty-first, using the months available for the first forty-eight months and then the most recent forty-eight calendar months thereafter.

Section 16. Whereas, this Act is necessary for the support of the state government and its existing public institutions, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this Act shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval."
