I respectfully return to you Senate Bill 108 with my VETO. Senate Bill 108 is an Act to provide an educational exception to consumption prohibitions for person over eighteen years of age who are required to taste an alcoholic beverage as part of a course. This bill would enable underage South Dakotans to consume alcohol.

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Senate Bill 108 raises several questions because of flawed language. While the intent may be different, nothing in this bill limits the sale, service, or consumption of alcohol to specific class locations or specific class times. SDCL 35-1-14 allows consumption of alcohol, but then section three attempts to permit taste but not consumption — this creates conflicting language. Such specifications are not necessary under current law, which keeps the drinking age at 21.

This flawed language creates potential loopholes that pose problems for law enforcement. Officers encountering underage students with alcohol on their breath or in their system must

determine if this exception to underage drinking laws applies before writing a citation. We should respect the work of law enforcement by not needlessly making their jobs any tougher.

This legislation amends a statute that we created in 2020, which was carefully crafted to allow alcohol in these classes under a specific set of protections. I signed that legislation because of the key provision preventing students under the age of 21 from participating in courses that produced and consumed alcoholic beverages. To strike this provision after just a couple of years undermines the basic premise of that legislation. I ask the legislature to honor the intent of the 2020 legislative compromise allowing these classes to be created.

The sponsors have cited workforce as their reason for bringing this legislation. While I appreciate their acknowledgement that South Dakota has the strongest economy in the nation, I don't believe that allowing underage students to consume alcohol will solve specific workforce issues. Those industries have continued to grow and thrive, both before and after the legislation I signed only three years ago.

For these reasons, I oppose Senate Bill 108 and ask that you sustain my VETO.

19 Dear Mr. President and Members of the Senate,

I respectfully return to you Senate Bill 129 with my VETO. Senate Bill 129 is an Act to include school employees in certain assault provisions and provide a penalty therefor.

Current law provides for enhanced penalties when someone is convicted of simple and/or aggravated assault of law enforcement officers while the officer is engaged in the performance of their official duties. This legislation would provide the same enhanced penalty for the assault of public and/or non-public school employees when engaged in school-related activity.

This veto does not take away from the appreciation I have for our school employees. They carry the great responsibility of educating and caring for our children, and there's no question they deserve a safe working environment. But unlike school employees, the nature of the work and responsibility of law enforcement makes enhanced penalties a necessity to protect the integrity of our institutions, as law enforcement officers are expressly tasked with risking their lives to protect the public.

While anyone who assaults a school employee also needs to be held accountable, our current statute provides that accountability. South Dakota already has a strong and fair criminal justice system, and school districts have robust disciplinary policies tailored to address behavior within their districts. The changes SB 129 makes would open the door for additional occupations to ask for special treatment under the law.

Additionally, this legislation has the potential for unintended consequences. For example, "school-related activities" is broad and could encompass situations that extend beyond the intent of the bill. Consider a personal altercation between two teachers during a school day. Because the incident occurred while the employees were engaged in the school-related activity, this legislation would allow for escalated charges for the guilty party. Situations like this would undermine the bill's intent.

For these reasons, I oppose Senate Bill 129 and ask that you sustain my veto.

On page 1, line 3, of the House State Affairs Engrossed bill, after "1." delete "The Legislature finds that the Secretary of State has various administrative functions that are necessary to ensure a fair and orderly petition and election process. These functions include but are not limited to sampling signatures to ensure their validity; certifying measures for the ballot; and preparing, printing, and distributing ballots.

The Legislature finds that in addition to these administrative functions, it is also essential to provide sufficient time for the resolution of any legal challenges related to the petition circulation process. Such challenges may involve allegations of fraud, forgery, filing of false instruments, or other illegalities, and may be subject to review by both the Circuit Court and the Supreme Court.

The Legislature finds that such litigation can be time-consuming and complex, and therefore, it is necessary to allow adequate time for it to be conducted in a thorough and fair manner.

Accordingly, the Legislature finds that it is important to establish a clear timeline for the election process and deadline for petition submission that allows for both the Secretary of State's administrative functions and the resolution of any legal challenges.

To this end, the Legislature determines that the following time windows are necessary:

The Legislature finds that general election day in South Dakota is the Tuesday after the first Monday in November. Therefore, general election day occurs within November 2 to November 8.

The Legislature finds that the absentee voting period begins 46 days prior to the general election. Therefore, absentee voting begins within September 17 to September 23.

The Legislature finds that the South Dakota Secretary of State requires approximately one month to prepare and print all ballots to be used on general election day. Therefore, the time period for preparing and printing ballots must begin within August 18 to August 24.

The Legislature finds that 60 days time is minimally sufficient to accommodate an appeal in the Supreme Court. Therefore, the time window for an appeal in the Supreme Court must begin within June 19 to June 25.

The Legislature finds that 60 days time is minimally sufficient to accommodate an action in circuit court to challenge the validity of petition signatures. Therefore, the time window for a circuit court challenge must begin within April 20 to April 26.

The Legislature finds that the South Dakota Secretary of State requires approximately 45 days to review petition signatures for validity and certify a measure for the ballot. Therefore, the time window for a circuit court challenge must begin within March 6 to March 12.

Therefore, the Legislature finds that the petition submission deadline shall be the second Tuesday in March."
