REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES

MR. PRESIDENT:

The Committee on Senate Judiciary respectfully reports that it has had under consideration **HB 1245** and returns the same with the recommendation that said bill be amended as follows:

1245B

On the Introduced bill, delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:"

Section 1. That § 26-8C-3 be AMENDED:

26-8C-3. An apparent or alleged delinquent child taken into temporary custody by a law enforcement officer prior to a temporary custody hearing shall be released to the child's parents, guardian, or custodian unless the parents, guardian, or custodian cannot be located, or in the judgment of the intake officer, are not suitable to receive the child, in which case the child shall be placed in shelter. A child may not be placed in detention unless the intake officer finds that the parents, guardian, or custodian are not available or are not suitable to receive the child, and finds at least one of the following circumstances exists:

(1) The child is a fugitive from another jurisdiction;

(2) The child is charged with a violation of § 22-22-7, a crime of violence under subdivision 22-1-2(9), or a serious property crime, which, if committed by an adult, would be a felony;

(3) The child is already held in detention or on conditional release in connection with another delinquency proceeding;

(4) The child has a demonstrable recent record of willful failures to appear for juvenile court proceedings;

(5) The child has a demonstrable recent record of violent conduct;

(6) The child has a demonstrable recent record of adjudications for serious property offenses;

(7) The child is under the influence of alcohol, inhalants, or a controlled drug or substance and detention is the least restrictive alternative in view of the gravity of the alleged offense and is necessary for the physical safety of the child, the public, and others; ~~or~~

(8) The child has failed to comply with court services or a court ordered program; or

(9) There are specific, articulated circumstances that justify detention, not to exceed five days, for the protection of the child from potentially immediate harm to the child or to others.

The shelter or detention authorized ~~shall~~ must be the least restrictive alternative available.

Section 2. That § 26-7A-21 be AMENDED:

26-7A-21. If the child is an apparent, alleged, or adjudicated delinquent child, after the temporary custody hearing the court shall release the child from temporary custody to the child's parents, guardian, or custodian, with or without restriction or condition or upon written promise of the child's parents, guardian, or custodian regarding the custody and supervision of the child and the subsequent appearance of the child in court at a time, date, and place to be determined by the court, unless the court finds that the child should continue to be held in temporary custody of court services for any of the following reasons:

1 (1) The child is a fugitive from another jurisdiction;

2 (2) The child is charged with a violation of § 22-22-7, a crime of violence under
3 subdivision 22-1-2(9), or a property crime, which, if committed by an adult, would be a felony;

4 (3) The child is already held in detention or on conditional release in connection with
5 another delinquency proceeding;

6 (4) The child has a demonstrable recent record of willful failures to appear at juvenile
7 court proceedings;

8 (5) The child has a demonstrable recent record of violent conduct;

9 (6) The child has a demonstrable recent record of adjudications for serious property
10 offenses;

11 (7) The child is still under the influence of alcohol, inhalants, or a controlled drug or
12 substance; ~~or~~

13 (8) The child has failed to comply with court services or a court ordered program; or

14 (9) There are specific, articulated circumstances that justify detention, not to exceed five days,
15 for the protection of the child from potentially immediate harm to the child or to others."

16 And that as so amended, **HB 1245** do pass, and having been certified as uncontested, be
17 placed on the consent calendar.

32 foregoing, the person must make a one-time payment to the owner, prior to entry, in the amount
33 of five hundred dollars as compensation for entering the owner's property"

35 For the purpose of this section, the term "examination" means an inspection of a property to
36 obtain general information which is not a matter of public record. For the purpose of this section,
37 the term "survey" means a more detailed, comprehensive, or invasive investigation of a property"

8 conditions stated in the easement, except that the term of any such easement may not exceed fifty
9 years. "

10 On page 1, line 20, of the House Commerce and Energy Engrossed bill, after "easement."
11 delete " In addition to an initial payment for the easement, payments associated with the granting
12 or continuance of any carbon pipeline easement must be made on an annual basis to the owner of
13 record of the real property and must include a payment of at least one dollar per linear foot of
14 carbon pipeline on the property, payable each year the pipeline is engaged in actual transportation
15 of carbon dioxide."

16 And that as so amended, **HB 1186** do pass.

22 benefit.

23 **SB 43:** FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to establish procedures for the imposition of fines and
24 probation against medical cannabis establishments, increase the allowable fee for a medical
25 cannabis establishment registration certificate, and direct the Department of Health to promulgate
26 rules to increase the fee for a registration certificate.

27 **SB 58:** FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to revise provisions regarding money transmission.

28 **SB 64:** FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to revise provisions related to the regulation of
29 emergency medical services and associated personnel.

30 **SB 66:** FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to make an appropriation for eligible water, wastewater,
31 and storm water projects throughout state government, and to declare an emergency.

32 **SB 67:** FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to provide for the sale of certain real estate located in
33 Hughes County and to provide for the deposit of the proceeds into a continuously appropriated fund.

34 **SB 70:** FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to make an appropriation for the replacement of the
35 Richmond Lake dam and spillway, for the general maintenance and repair of other state-owned
36 dams, and to declare an emergency.

SB 71: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to remove a prohibition on the ability of law enforcement and various governmental entities to inspect, search, seize, prosecute, or impose disciplinary action on cannabis dispensaries, cultivation facilities, manufacturing facilities, and testing facilities.

SB 72: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to increase the annual limit of tax credits that an insurance company may claim through the partners in education tax credit program.

SB 136: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to expand the scope of a physician wellness program and to declare an emergency.

SB 173: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to provide a landowner-on-own-land license for antlerless elk.

SB 199: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to revise provisions pertaining to the consolidation or boundary changes of counties.

SB 219: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to modify provisions related to the control of counties and municipalities over medical marijuana establishments within their jurisdictions.

HB 1060: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to revise certain provisions related to travel reimbursement.

HB 1098: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to provide free birth certificates to persons experiencing homelessness.

HB 1118: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to revise unclaimed property provisions.

HB 1131: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to waive certain fees for nondriver identification cards for individuals who are homeless.

HB 1211: FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to repeal the Midwestern Regional Higher Education Compact.

And signed the same in the presence of the Senate.
