13 Dear Lieutenant Governor Venhuizen,

I write to announce that I have signed Senate Bill 83. We all know someone – a friend, a lovedone, or someone else in our lives – who struggles with chemical dependency. I respect the decision of the legislature to pass this bill, though legislators were narrowly divided on this issue. This was a difficult decision, and I see both sides of the debate. I do have concerns about the impact that this bill will have on public safety in South Dakota, and I recognize that law enforcement groups opposed it. We must find better ways to rehabilitate those who are stuck in addiction and chemical dependency. My signature today cannot be the end of the discussion.

We need all three branches of government – the legislature, the executive branch, and the judiciary – to continue working toward solutions. We must expand treatment opportunities for those with substance abuse disorder and make sure that the punishment fits the crime. The Unified Judicial System will assemble a task force this summer to examine resources to South Dakota treatment courts, and my Project Prison Reset will be analyzing the needs of our prison system – a review that must include impact of our laws and criminal penalties on our incarcerated population. That work and more must continue. I'm focused on solutions.

I am committed to working closely with all law enforcement groups to carefully monitor the implementation of this law. If we find that it is not achieving the intended outcomes, we will make necessary adjustments. That is the essence of our republican system of government – an ongoing process of innovation and improvement, where we test new ideas, learn from experience, and continuously strive to do better.

Individuals struggling with addiction need treatment and support. A felony conviction can create obstacles for the rest of an individual's life. We cannot legislate felony punishments without understanding the gravity of that reality and the lifelong burden of a felony conviction. Labeling individuals stuck in chemical dependency as "felons" makes it harder for them to secure employment, housing, and a stable future.

We should focus on getting people into treatment, not into prison. The criminal justice system is not a substitute for rehabilitation, and incarceration does not address the root causes of addiction. Instead, incarceration only increases prison overcrowding. Our current facilities cannot provide adequate rehabilitative services; they currently have a long waitlist for the very programs designed to help South Dakotans recover and reintegrate into society.

With the limited availability for rehabilitation at the current State Penitentiary, all we can really
do is lock 'em up. By focusing on treatment instead of incarceration, we can help keep families intact
and give people a chance at real recovery.

1 Finally, under this law, a third offense will remain a felony, holding accountable those who 2 refuse treatment and disregard opportunities for rehabilitation. By reforming these laws, we can 3 redirect resources toward effective treatment programs, reduce unnecessary incarceration, and help 4 achieve recovery for those struggling with substance abuse disorder.

There is more to be said and done on the issue of our criminal justice system and how we help 6 South Dakotans rehabilitate from addiction. Again, I'm focused on solutions, and I appreciate the continued work of both the legislature and our justice system towards those solutions.

19 I respectfully return to you House Bill 1132 with my VETO. House Bill 1132 is an Act to establish 20 provisions for eligibility in the child care assistance program for certain child care employees.

21 House Bill 1132 shifts South Dakota's child care assistance program away from its core mission. 22 Currently, the program is designed as a safety net to help low-income families cover child care costs 23 while they work toward self-sufficiency. This bill would give child care workers preferential 24 treatment, by allowing them to receive this aid at a higher income level. This would be the first time 25 in South Dakota that our state safety net programs would give enhanced benefits to people working 26 in one type of job or occupation, and it would transform this program into a long-term workforce 27 subsidy rather than what its focus should be: temporary support for families in need.

28 Additionally, the bill includes no appropriation to cover the cost of expansion. If just 5% of 29 South Dakota's current child care workforce applies, the program will require an additional \$3.8 30 million in state general funds. If half of the current workforce applies, the program grows by \$38 31 million. The lack of new funding creates a zero-sum game, and this expansion would force reductions in benefits or waiting lists for the low-income families the program was originally designed to 32 33 support.

34 The Department of Social Services has been actively implementing solutions to support the 35 child care industry and workforce. These solutions focus on sustainable approaches and do not 36 involve expanding our state's safety net program beyond its intended purpose. The state's role in 37 promoting our child care workforce should be supporting economic development and encouraging private sector solutions - not broadening government safety nets into permanent workforce 38 39 subsidies.

- 40 For these reasons I object to House Bill 1132, and I ask that you sustain my VETO.
