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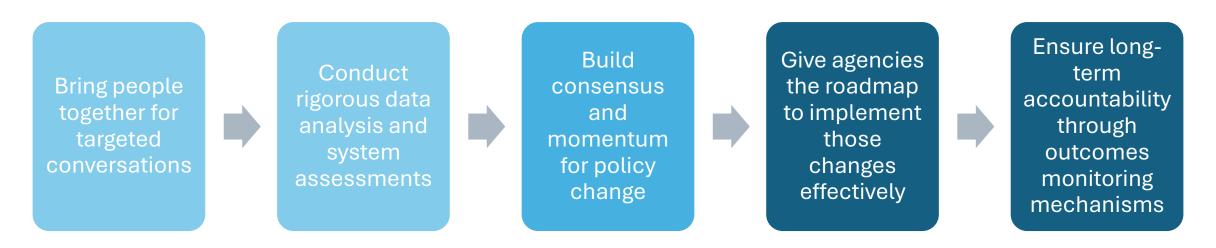

How We Work





Montana improved the quality of prison programs

Problem:

State leaders didn't know if in-prison programming investments were reducing recidivism as intended

Montana's Approach:

- Convened an evaluation committee to align programs with evidence, standardize offerings, and prioritize high-impact initiatives
- Established program standards and quality
 assurance processes to ensure best practices
- Adopted an evidence-based evaluation tool to measure program effectiveness
- Trained staff in research-validated practices

Outcomes:

- DOC focused resources on a set of 23 vetted evidence-based programs
- Every program regularly assessed for quality and adherence to model



North Dakota increased the availability communitybased behavioral health services upon reentry

Problem:

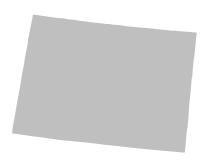
- The prison population was increasing, driven by admissions for low-level offenses and revocations from supervision.
- North Dakota ranked 6th highest in alcohol and drug abuse, but 43rd in the availability of treatment in the nation.

North Dakota's Approach:

 Created Free Through Recovery, a new community-based behavioral health services program for people on probation and parole

Outcomes (Through July 1, 2025):

- **7,931** total participants since 2017; 1,500 currently enrolled (capacity expanding to 2,000)
- 70% achieved 3 of 4 stability outcomes monthly:
 - Housing: **78**%
 - Employment: **70**%
 - Recovery: **72**%
 - Law enforcement: **75**%



Wyoming transformed supervision practices to reduce prison admissions

Problem:

- Prisons at capacity with overflow being held out of state
- Behavioral health challenges increasing supervision revocations

Wyoming's Approach:

- Required supervision officers to use evidence-informed practices to manage the behavior of people on supervision
- Required the use of validated risk and need assessments
- Trained supervision officers in evidencebased practices to reduce recidivism

Outcomes:

- 20% decrease in prison admissions for supervision violations (2018– 2023)
- 20% decrease in supervision failures (FY21 vs. FY19)
- 19% increase in successful supervision completions (no return to custody within 3 years)

As South Dakota invests in a new prison, it has a critical opportunity to advance recidivism reduction goals.

An in-depth assessment process can get South Dakota policymakers the information they need to develop targeted programming and reentry improvements.

WHO?

- Who is—and isn't receiving programming and services?
- When and how are people accessing them?
- What are people's needs, including for culturally responsive programming?

WHAT?

- What programs and services currently exist?
- Where are the gaps between what exists and what people need?
- Is South Dakota
 directing resources
 toward the interventions
 most effective at
 reducing recidivism?

HOW WELL?

- Are programs being implemented as effectively as possible?
- How can quality assurance be strengthened?
- How can South Dakota monitor outcomes to continue progress?

Even effective reentry programs can fall short without the cross-agency collaboration needed to meet people's needs.

Significantly improving reentry outcomes means addressing complex, interconnected challenges.

Departments of Corrections play an important role, but they can't solve this alone.

- Human services
- Workforce
- Education
- Housing
- Behavioral health
- Community providers

State Highlight

Nebraska's Reentry 2030 goals:

- Increase GED completion by 30%
- Boost participation in vocational and life skills programs by 25%
- Ensure 100% of people leaving prison have IDs and birth certificates in hand
- Help at least 90% of people released find employment within 30 days

Collateral Consequences: National Model Policies

Fair Chance Hiring and Licensing

Expands licensure and job opportunities for people with criminal histories

Expungement

Erases or seals a criminal record making it unavailable to the public

Certificates of Relief

Offers credentials that provide evidence of rehabilitation

Employer Liability Protection

Limits the extent that employers can be held liable for negligent hiring based on employee's criminal record

17 states including KS and ND allow expungement for a wide range of felony convictions.

21 additional states including NE and WY allow expungement for a smaller subset of felonies.

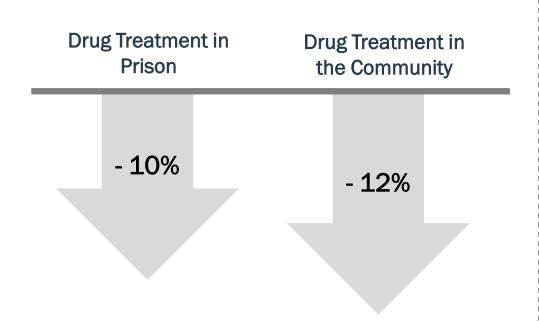
Waiting periods range from 3 to 10 years depending on the offense

An in-depth assessment of reentry and rehabilitative programming can ensure that the **right people** receive the **right interventions** at the **right time**.

A comprehensive reentry approach should also address cross-system barriers to reentry.

Programming provided in the community can be as effective and less expensive than programming in prison.

2024 South Dakota Annual Average Total Cost Per Person



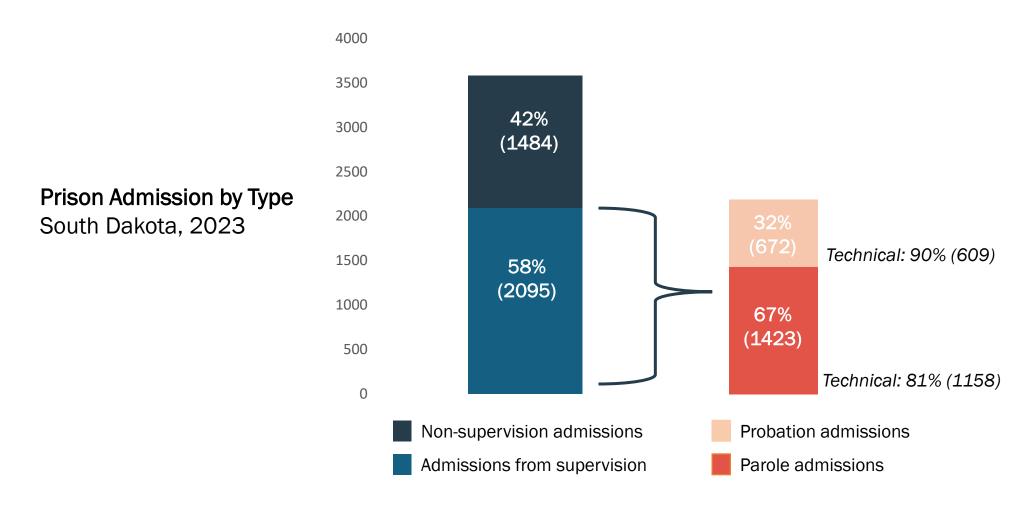
Projected Impact: Reducing Nonviolent and Drug Admissions to Prison

Percent Reduction of Admissions by Offense Type, South Dakota

	Projected Change in Prison Population		
	1 year	5 years	10 years
-10% all property and public order	-6	-29	-54
-10% all drug, property, public order	-15	-70	-127
-25% all property and public order	-14	-72	-135
-25% all drug, property, and public order	-36	-174	-319

Diversion for nonviolent and drug offenses could connect people to services while also potentially reducing prison admissions.

In 2023, people on supervision represented over half of all prison admissions in South Dakota.



Improving supervision success starts with an analysis on who's falling short.

Who?

What is the profile of people who are failing? Do certain groups need different types or more intensive support?

When?

How early in the supervision term do people fail? How should parole supervision and reentry support change over the trajectory of a supervision term?

Where should South Dakota prioritize resources?

Based on the reasons people fail supervision, where should state leaders focus improvements to get the largest impact?

Understanding who on supervision is entering prison, when, and where to focus resources would chart a course to reducing prison admissions and improving reentry outcomes.

South Dakota needs a clearer picture of its current system to develop tailored approaches that deliver measurable results.

The CSG Justice Center is currently partnering with SD DOC through the Advancing Data in Corrections Resident Analyst program.

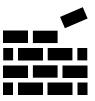
South Dakota applied for and was awarded a federally funded embedded data analyst through May 2026.
