## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 7

- 1 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION, Expressing support for all South Dakota high school
- 2 students learning and practicing the basic skills of hands-only Cardio Pulmonary
- 3 Resuscitation (CPR) prior to graduation.
- 4 WHEREAS, eighty-nine percent of people who suffer an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest die
- 5 because they do not receive immediate CPR from someone on the scene; and
- 6 WHEREAS, irreversible brain damage occurs after only three minutes of being deprived of
- 7 oxygen, and irreversible heart damage occurs within twenty minutes of being deprived of
- 8 oxygen; and
- 9 WHEREAS, the average response time between a 911 call received and an Emergency
- 10 Medical Service (EMS) arrival in South Dakota is ten minutes; and
- WHEREAS, eighty-eight percent of cardiac arrests actually occur at home, making it most
- 12 likely that a person who needs to give CPR will be attempting to save the life of a loved one;

- WHEREAS, hands-only CPR can double or even triple a victim's chance of survival; and
- WHEREAS, learning hands-only CPR can take as little as twenty minutes. In less time than
- 4 it takes to watch a television sitcom, a teacher can give students the skills they need to save
- 5 someone's life by giving CPR; and
- WHEREAS, including CPR as a skill taught to all South Dakota high school students would
- 7 train an average of eleven thousand students per year; and
- 8 WHEREAS, many of these students are located in very rural communities and homes which
- 9 have much longer EMS wait times than the state average of ten minutes; and
- WHEREAS, South Dakota has only one hundred twenty-three ambulance services in the
- state with some rural services ready to close their doors due to lack of personnel to cover calls,
- 12 little money to pay people to be on call, and a shrinking age-appropriate work force available
- to even show up for training or calls in their communities; and
- WHEREAS, ninety-nine South Dakota EMS services are listed as Basic Life Support only
- and twenty-five are listed as Advanced Life Support:
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the Eighty-Ninth Legislature
- of the State of South Dakota, the House of Representatives concurring therein, that the
- 18 Legislature supports CPR becoming a basic skill that is taught in a required course in high
- 19 school: and
- 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature encourages school districts to
- 21 incorporate hands-only CPR training throughout South Dakota.
