SCR601B

On the Introduced bill, delete everything after the title and insert:	
WHEREAS, in 2002, Congress amended the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946	
to require that retailers notify customers purchasing covered commodities,	
including beef and pork, of the commodities' origin, by means of a "Country	
of Origin Label" (COOL); and	
WHEREAS, the COOL requirements were not applicable to restaurants,	
cafeterias, or processed foods; and	
WHEREAS, the COOL requirements were designed to provide retailers with	
flexible labeling options that included bands, placards, pin tags, signs,	
stickers, and twist ties, for conveying the information in a legible form and in	
a conspicuous manner; and	
WHEREAS, in May 2015, based on complaints from Canada and Mexico, the	
World Trade Organization determined that COOL violated United States trade	
obligations and threatened to impose retaliatory duties of \$1.1 billion, unless	
this country removed the requirement that covered commodities, including	
beef and pork, be sold with a COOL; and	
WHEREAS, in December 2015, Congress removed mandatory COOL	
requirements for muscle cut beef and pork, and for ground beef and pork;	
<u>and</u>	
WHEREAS, the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement ultimately did not	
include COOL:	
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Senate of the Ninety-Fifth	
Legislature of the State of South Dakota, the House of Representatives	
concurring therein, that the Legislature urgently requests the President of the	
United States and the United States Trade Representative to negotiate and	
execute agreements, with Canada and Mexico, which will remove trade	
barriers to COOL; and	
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the secretary of the Senate transmit copies	
of this resolution to the President of the United States, the speaker and clerk	
of the United States House of Representatives, the president pro tempore and	
secretary of the United States Senate, and to the members of the South	
Dakota Congressional delegation.
