## House Concurrent Resolution 6001

Introduced by: Representative Mulally

1	A CONCURRENT	RESOLUTION	, Supporting	the Electoral	College.

2	WHEREAS, the current electoral college system respects states as the essential units in
3	our compound republic, protecting their power and voice in presidential elections; and
4	WHEREAS, the current electoral college system respects the separation and balance of
5	power and authority between the states and the federal government; and
6	WHEREAS, the current electoral college system creates a needed balance between rural
7	and urban interests and ensures that the winning candidate has support from multiple regions
8	of the country; and
9	WHEREAS, the current electoral college system ensures that each state's electoral votes
LO	are awarded based on how the state's citizens vote; and
l1	WHEREAS, the current electoral college system best preserves our constitutional
12	separation of powers and prevents the fracture of America's political structure; and
L3	WHEREAS, the founding fathers rejected a national popular vote for president and instead
L4	created the Electoral College; and
L5	WHEREAS, the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact diminishes the importance of
L6	individual states in presidential elections, creates the potential for nationwide recounts, and
L7	opens the door to greater federal control; and
L8	WHEREAS, under the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact, a state's electoral vote
L9	could be awarded to a candidate opposed by the majority of our state's citizens; and

- 1 WHEREAS, the constitutionality of the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact is
- 2 doubtful because it appears to violate the text of the Compact Clause of the United States
- 3 Constitution and the intent of the electoral college clauses:
- 4 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the Ninety-Ninth
- 5 <u>Legislature of the State of South Dakota, the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislature</u>
- 6 <u>supports the Electoral College and believes the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact may</u>
- 7 be unconstitutional.
