## HOUSE BILL NO. 1224

Introduced by: Representatives Frye-Mueller, Dennert, Jensen (Kevin), Pischke, and Randolph and Senators Nelson, DiSanto, and Jensen (Phil)

1	FOR AN ACT ENTITLED, An Act to revise certain provisions regarding violations of county
2	and municipal ordinances.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA:
4	Section 1. That § 7-18A-2 be repealed.
5	7-18A-2. Each county may enact, amend, and repeal such ordinances and resolutions as may
6	be proper and necessary to carry into effect the powers granted to it by law and provide for the
7	enforcement of each violation of any ordinance by means of any or all of the following:
8	(1) A fine not to exceed the fine established by subdivision 22-6-2(2) for each violation,
9	or by imprisonment for a period not to exceed thirty days for each violation, or by
10	both the fine and imprisonment; or
11	(2) An action for civil injunctive relief, pursuant to chapter 21-8.
12	Section 2. That § 7-18A-32 be repealed.
13	7-18A-32. Actions for violations of county ordinances shall be civil cases and the county
14	shall be the plaintiff. The actions shall be commenced by the filing of a complaint and the
15	response thereto shall be by oral plea or written answer. Conduct for the trials of violation of

1 county ordinances and resolutions shall be governed by the procedure used in all proceedings

- 2 for violations of ordinances and bylaws of units of local government of this state as referred to
- 3 in § 23A-1-1. If the procedure does not cover or apply to a specific portion of the proceeding,
- 4 the rules of civil procedure apply.
- 5 Section 3. That chapter 7-18A be amended by adding a NEW SECTION to read:
- 6 Every county may enact, make, amend, revise, or repeal all ordinances, resolutions, and
- 7 regulations as may be proper and necessary to carry into effect the powers granted thereto. Any
- 8 person who violates this section shall be assessed a fine by the court in the amount of twenty-
- 9 five dollars per violation and not to exceed five hundred dollars at the time of judgement. The
- fine shall be deposited in the county general fund.
- 11 Section 4. That § 9-19-3 be amended to read:
- 9-19-3. Every municipality may enact, make, amend, revise, or repeal all such ordinances,
- 13 resolutions, and regulations as may be proper and necessary to carry into effect the powers
- granted thereto, and to provide for the punishment of each violation thereof by a fine not to
- exceed the fine established by subdivision 22-6-2(2), by imprisonment not exceeding thirty
- 16 days, or by both the fine and imprisonment. Any person who violates this section shall be
- 17 assessed a fine by the court in the amount of twenty-five dollars per violation and not to exceed
- 18 five hundred dollars at the time of judgement. The fine shall be deposited in the municipal
- 19 general fund.
- Section 5. That § 9-19-3.1 be repealed.
- 21 9-19-3.1. In the prosecution for the violation of any municipal ordinance which authorizes
- 22 a penalty of a jail sentence, the municipality must prove the defendant guilty of the violation of
- 23 the ordinance beyond a reasonable doubt. The proceedings shall be commenced by complaint
- 24 naming the first or second class municipality as plaintiff, and the response thereto shall be by

- 1 either oral plea or written answer. The defendant shall be entitled, by making demand therefor
- 2 at any time before the commencement of trial, to trial by jury in the event the defendant is
- 3 subject to any jail sentence. Except as provided in this section the proceedings shall be governed
- 4 by the rules of civil procedure.
