Have you heard of the 988 number? If you haven't, now is a great time to learn more about it. 988 is the suicide crisis hotline. Anyone experiencing a suicide crisis can call or text the hotline to connect with support, free of charge. South Dakota needs more Native American Foster Families. It's crucial that our Native American children who enter foster care stay with a Native American family to ensure cultural continuity. Office of Indian Education Director Fred Osborn is wrapping up the final phase of the Wóokiye project. The final phase includes the Oceti Sakowin Essential Understandings and Standards (OSEUS) online training course that is free to anyone interested in taking the course. OCETI SAKOWIN ESSENTIAL UNDERSTANDINGS AND STANDARDS (OSEUS) ONLINE TRAINING COURSE

ABOUT THE COURSE

This Office of Indian Education has created the OSEUS training course to assist administrators and teachers in integrating the Oceti Sakowin Essential Understandings into their schools and classrooms. The training course contains three sections: "Getting to Know the OSEUS," "Culturally Responsive Practices," and "Creating Lessons with Inquiry Design Model.

The course is free of charge and self-paced!

Continuing Education Credits or Graduate Credits are offered upon completion!

SECTION I

"Getting to Know the OSEUS," guided by the wisdom of indigenous elders from South Dakota, explores the significance of the land, environment, identity, culture, language, oral traditions, sovereignty, and way of life of the Oceti Sakowin people.



SECTION 2

"Culturally Responsive Practices" guides teachers through understanding their indigenous students' backgrounds and promotes socio-cultural consciousness. In this section, educators can expect to embrace the unique cultures of our Native American tribes.



SECTION 3

"Creating Lessons with Inquiry Design Model" provides guidance to teachers on how to incorporate OSEUS teachings into lesson plan content across various grade levels. Additionally, the course provides guidance to administrators on creating a year-long plan for OSEUS vertical alignment in their school.



In May, we welcomed an exciting addition to our office. Algin Young, former Chief of Police for the Oglala Sioux Tribe, joined the department as the Tribal Law Enforcement Liaison. Algin will be working with each tribe to find ways to combat law enforcement shortages and to facilitate collaboration between the state and tribes to address drug and crime issues on South Dakota tribal reservations. In August, our department attended the South Dakota Suicide Prevention Conference with our traveling booth. We had many great conversations and learned an abundance of information. I was deeply moved by many of the speakers who shared their lived experiences with suicide and the impact that it has had on them. I want to thank the Department of Social Services for continuing to host the South Dakota Suicide Prevention Conference and for shedding light on this important topic.

My staff and I have been traveling around the state with our tribal-specific suicide prevention booth to spread information about the 988 number and available resources. Later this month, our department will partner with the South Dakota Department of Health for the Indigenous and Integrative Health Summit. MEET ALGIN YOUNG



Algin Young, Sr. joined the South Dakota Department of Tribal Relations in May of 2024 as the Tribal Law Enforcement Liaison.

Algin is an enrolled member of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, where he was raised on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation. Algin is a devoted father to five children and shares a 23-year-long marriage with his wife, Monica.

Algin graduated from Crazy Horse High School High School in Wanblee, South Dakota. After high school, he enlisted in the United States Marines, proudly serving until his honorable discharge in 2001. He initiated his law enforcement career with the Oglala Sioux Tribe's Department of Public Safety, subsequently joining the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Law Enforcement Services (later known as the Office of Justice Services).

Algin's impressive 23-year law enforcement career within Indian Country has seen him undertake a wide range of crucial roles, including Police Officer, Special Agent (Criminal Investigator), Chief of Police, Indian Highway Safety Director, Regional Agent in Charge within the Division of Drug Enforcement, and Associate Director of Field Operations and Division of Drug Enforcement. While with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, he was stationed in South Dakota, Montana, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Algin returned home and successfully completed a three (3) year contract with the Oglala Sioux Tribe as the Chief of Police.

He proudly graduated from the Indian Police Academy in Artesia, New Mexico, and completed the Criminal Investigator Training Course in Glynco, Georgia. He also assisted in the development & deployment of Operation Lady Justice, which laid the ground work for the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Persons (MMIP) and the Office of Justice Services Division of Drug Enforcement's Mobile Enforcement Teams (MET), which were both very beneficial to Indian Country. Algin committed a career to an unwavering commitment to safeguarding our communities throughout all of Indian Country.

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
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

KEYNOTE PRESENTATIONS

Lakota Worldview as Related to Health, Wellness, and Healing

This session will discuss how the Woiwanke (Lakota Worldview) and a kinship-based approach is the foundation for health and healing using an example of the Oinajin Topa (Lakota Four Stages of Life). During this presentation, attendees will Learn about the interrelatedness or fining, body, emotions and spirit as a factor in individual velociess, the environmental conditions on context relative to health and wellness in from a Lakota perspective, and the historical and intergenerational considerations relevant to the current state of Lakota health and wellness.

Hmuya Mani (Walks With a Roaring), Richard Two Dogs is an enrolled member of the Oglala Sioux Tribe, a federally chartered indian tribe. He lives with his spouse in Porcupine, South Dakota in the Oglala Lakota Nation. Mr. Two Dogs is from the Mato Oyate, Klyuksas Band and is Oglala Lakota. He is an Oglala Lakota He is an Oglala Carditonal heater and a Wakan lyeska (Interpreter of the Sacred). His father is the late Asa Two Dogs, Sr. and his mother is the late Edna Lone Hill. Two Dogs. He descends from the bloodline of Medicine Horse, American Horse, Brown Cloud and Little Warrior. For more than three decades, Mr. Two Dogs has provided Lakota cultural services to many tribal nations in the United States and Canada. He has extensive experience in development and training in the areas of Lakota mental health and wellness, Lakota language revitalization, cultural competency, child and family development and individual/family healing.

Integrative and Lifestyle Medicine
