Vote from military or abroad

Military and voters living abroad can use a special process to vote absentee.

Track your absentee ballot

Track the status of your ballot or confirm that it was received back and accepted without problem.

Mail ballot precincts

Some cities and towns can hold elections by mail instead of voting at polling places.

Absentee ballot applications are to be delivered to the appropriate election official by mail, in person, by fax or as a scanned attachment to an email. Uniformed service members stationed away from home and citizens living outside the United States may also receive and return voted ballots by fax or electronic means according to North Dakota law. For more information, please read the information for Military Voters and for Overseas Voters.

According to North Dakota law, absentee ballots are to be made available by the 40th day before the election. Returned absentee ballots must have an official postmark or date stamp on the envelope, email, or fax by the day before the election.

All county election offices will accept early-voting applications up to 120 days prior to a statewide primary, general election or special election. However, regular early-voting ballots are not sent out or voted until at least 35 days before a primary or general election and 15 days prior to all other elections. All early-voting ballots whether delivered in person or carrier to the county drop box or by mail must arrive by the close of polls on the day of the election.

Do I need to give the reason why I am voting early when applying for Early Voting ballots?

No, since 1999 Nebraska law has not required a person to disclose a reason for their request on the Early Voting application.

A written application for a mailed absentee ballot must be received by the voter's County Auditor no later than 5:00 p.m. 15 days before the election. If the request is received so late that it is unlikely the absentee ballot can be returned by mail in time to be considered for counting, the county auditor will enclose a statement to that effect with the absentee ballot.

For primary and general elections, the ballots are mailed no later than 20 days before election day. For other elections, ballots are mailed to voters as soon as they are ready. The county auditor will include instructions on how to mark the ballot as well as how to return the ballot.

- ▼ When Can I Receive or Pick up My Absentee Ballot?
 - Any registered voter can obtain their absentee ballot as early as 28 days (45 days for military or overseas voters) prior to the election or any day after by contacting their county clerk's office but not on Election Day.
 - Mailed ballots will be sent 28 days (45 days for military or overseas voters) before the election to all voters who have requested that an absentee ballot be mailed. Absentee ballot requests received after 28 days (45 days for military or overseas voters) will be sent as soon as possible. (Mail delivery within the county may take up to seven (7) days, and longer if your mailing address is outside the county.)
